ABOUT THE REGION

The Banda Islands, also known as the Spice Islands, located in the Indonesian province of Maluku, are a volcanic group of ten small volcanic islands in the Banda Sea.

Until the mid-19th century the Banda Islands were the world's only source of the spices nutmeg and mace, produced from the nutmeg tree. The spices were used as flavorings, medicines, and preserving agents that were at the time highly valued in European markets. They were sold by Arab traders to the Venetians for exorbitant prices. The traders did not divulge the exact location of their source and no European was able to deduce their location.

Prior to 1500, no European had ever landed on the shores of Maluku, and the nutmeg and mace trading has only been handled through Asian traders.

After the first Portuguese and European vessel, under the stewardship of Francisco Serrao, arrived in Maluku in April 1512, the balance of power that had remained quite stable and little changed over the centuries, changed abruptly. The building of a series of forts set a new precedent in Maluku. The forts were built to ensure security as an Asian trading centre and to protect goods and people so they would not be arbitrarily seized by a local ruler.




The islands have had a long and fascinating history. Topside, the Banda Islands boast climbable volcanic mountains which are covered in lush green vegetation.

The 10 small volcanic islands are 200 km from the nearest port town of Ambon. Banda's tiny volcanic islets are surrounded by deep waters that create perfect conditions for crystal-clear diving: visibility reaches 40 m from February-May.

Banda's incredibly diverse fish population and its breathtaking array of larger pelagics, majestic hammerhead sharks, and giant tuna, mean that when you go diving in Banda Sea you will never be disappointed. This area is also home to the world's largest population of Napoleon wrasse, these beautiful creatures accompany you on almost every dive here.

There is nowhere better in Indonesia for the chance to see large pelagic fish life and large numbers of sharks, combine that with some deep indo/Dutch history, old abandoned forts, nutmeg plantations and local markets. Exploring Banda with Fenides Liveaboard is a unique mix of diving, luxury, culture and relaxation.



























DAY 6 - 8

More chances for Hammerhead sharks await and Pulau Hatta is no exception.

Back in the main Banda chain we will explore the walls of Tanjung Buton and Hatta Wall. Along with frequent shark sightings. Mobula rays are common as are large tuna and mackerel.

"Pohon Miring" is a literal fish soup and has something for everyone and "Lava Flow" is a black volcanic Macro dive full of wonderfully weird creatures.

As we spend 3 days in this general area we have the opportunity to do some night dives and spend our evenings in the calm protected bay areas of the island chain.

The main Banda chain consists of the large islands of Pulau Hatta, Banda Nera, Pulau Suanggi, Pulau Ai and Pulau Run. Each island offers something different and with over 30 known dive sites around these islands we are surely not getting bored!

It may also possible to experience a little bit of local culture and history from the Spice Islands as weather permitting we can spend some time walking around the village of Banda Naira and visit one of many tourist attractions like, the local museum or the Old Dutch fort, the old colonial governor's house, the local fish market, and a nutmeg plantation.
